THE JOY OF LIVING





Innovator forsees expanding horizons in education

Nine local citizens of broad and varied experiences, background, interests and abilities administer Cheltenham Township's educational needs with a \$7 million budget paid by 40,000 inhabitants. Elected by their peers, they uphold the trust placed in them by maintaining up-to-date, modern, clean and well-equipped schools staffed by capable professionals.



As the population of Cheltenham Township has expanded, so have its educational environments, techniques and opportunities. Enumeration could not do them justice. With the warmest gratitude and the best of wishes, the El Delator and the student body of Cheltenham High School salute Dr. Ross M. Gill and appreciate the reflections on the educational process contained in his final letter to the 1968 graduating class.

"A good education turns students on so that they can respond effectively to the world. When you first started to go to school your appetite for learning was great. Yet, too many people lose their zest with the passing years, and the school is to some degree responsible. Teaching can be deadly—like digging a well; but good teaching is more like unearthing a spring. You, the student, also have a responsibility. Think of the joys that accompany life, living, and work. It is not hard work that is dreary; superficial work is.

"Producing something worthwhile leads to satisfaction and happiness. Absolute insistence upon all or nothing does little to improve things on this troubled planet. Seek a balance between maintaining your principles and insisting on them absolutely in the grubby, day-to-day business of living and working as honorably as you can, without self-delusion and without despair.



Dr. Keim advises seniors to search for Greek ideal

Dear Members of the Class of 1968:

I have watched with interest as your yearbook staff has developed the theme "We Are Greeks, All of Us!" The ancient inhabitants of the Peloponnesus and the surrounding area were a unique and fascinating people. For centuries that part of the world had known civilized peoples, some quite highly civilized; yet the Greeks emerged as a vastly different type of people. They were not numerous, not very powerful, not very well organized, yet they had a totally new conception of what human life was for, and demonstrated for the first time the infinite realm of the human mind. It was in matters of the mind that the Greeks were unique. Their brief civilization is a golden sunbeam breaking through the darkened windows of history.

It was, however, in the area of government that the Greeks made their greatest contribution. The Hellenes thought of themselves as free men. State affairs were public affairs. The Greek was ruled by a known law which respected justice. The Greek term "eleutheria"

—of which "freedom" is only an incomplete translation—was much more than freedom from slavery; it included a total concept of the place of man. The Greeks believed that any obeisance was an affront to human dignity. Even to the gods the Greeks prayed like men, erect; yet they knew as well as any the difference between the human and the divine. The Greek knew that he was not a god, but he was at least a man, and as a man he was free and obligated to strive for the perfection of the human mind and spirit.

Your theme "We Are Greeks, All of Us!" gives to each member of the Class of 1968 a directive and challenge. Your productive and creative lives lie ahead. You, like the Greeks, are free individuals—free to continue to perfect yourselves and to push on in the search for beauty and human perfectability. Yet like the Greeks, you must preserve your freedom at all cost.




Orchestra invokes muse for instrumental inspiration




Conductor Henry Williams expresses his disbelief at cacophony issuing from the violin.






Musical virtuosos honored with district recognition




Collegiate sages reveal passport to academic future













Public Relations coordinates Cheltenham rumors

When the Greeks wanted to send news to their neighbors they had to use runners, people who carried their messages on foot. Cheltenham students are more fortunate—they have the Public Relations Committee. The PR staff is responsible for informing the school community of activities taking place at Cheltenham. They send news releases on a weekly basis to nine local newspapers. These releases concern Student Council activities, curriculum changes, innovations in school life, and special events in the lives of Cheltenham students. The newspapers include *The Breeze*, *The Times Chronicle*, and the northeast sections of *The Philadelphia Inquirer* and *The Evening Bulletin*.

In addition to newspaper releases, PR sends announcements on all paper drives, school plays, and other major activities to nine area radio stations. The bulletin boards on either side of the library are also products of the PR staff, displaying many of the articles published in recent weeks.

The Public Relations Committee is an integral part of school life, for it has established an important link between the school and the community. The residents of the area deserve to be informed of news from Cheltenham, and the messengers from the Public Relations committee have helped to bring them this news.

















Pygmalion presents theme for our "My Fair Lady"


In 1916 Bernard Shaw decided to transform into a play the mythical Greek legend of Pygmalion. The myth concerns a sculptor who creates from stone the image of his ideal woman. He works so proficiently that the statue comes to look human and is given a name—Galatea. Pygmalion loves his own work, and miraculously the form is also so pleasing to the goddesses that they give it the breath of life and enable the two to marry.

In Shaw's work, the linguist Henry Higgins takes a common flower girl from her gutter home and transforms her into a fashionable and beautiful lady by changing her speech. In the process he, like Pygmalion, falls in love with the girl, Eliza Doolittle. Unlike the mythical story, Higgins loses Miss Doolittle.

After Shaws death, his play was adapted for the musical stage by Lerner and Loewe; their adaption proved to be the longest running show on Broadway. In this form, Eliza's future is left to the imagination of the audience, but Lerner hints at a resolution closer to that of the original myth.








Opening the 1967 season with a 40-0 win over Dobbins, the Panthers knew they were going to pounce on their first winning season in three years. With precision tactics the Panthers won eight first downs and gained 281 yards rushing with scores, by the quarters, 6—20—6—8, totalling a 40-0 shut-out at the end of the game. Sophomore Joe Sciolla led the Panthers' charge with three touchdowns in his varsity debut. During the first quarter Chris Perry tore up the field with a 47-yard run and in the third period Joe Sciolla brought the fans to their feet with a 59-yard jaunt. Both runs hit paydirt. Defensively, the Panthers were really on the ball. Bernie D'Angelo proved this by stealing the ball from a Dobbins fullback and running it 23 yards for a touchdown.

The next week the Panthers continued their winning ways with a 38-7 rout of Methacton. Cheltenham capitalized on early Warrior miscues as Bernie D'Angelo intercepted a first period pass and charged 23 yards for a touchdown. On the first play of the Warriors' next series of plays, the alert Panthers recovered a Methacton fumble. They then proceeded to ramble 15 yards for another 6 points. The remainder of the game turned into a runaway as Benny Dempsey, in his first starting assignment of the year, tallied on two long runs. In the final period, Chris Perry took a screen pass from Tom Reifsnyder 37 yards to paydirt to cap the scoring.

At Norristown the Chelts engaged in a grueling defensive battle and emerged with a 7-0 victory. Cheltenham broke a scoreless tie in the third quarter when Benny Dempsey capped a 60 yard sustained drive with a two yard plunge into the end zone.

Friday, October 3, was truly an ominous day for Cheltenham when William Tennent inflicted the Panthers' first loss, 21-19. The Chelt offense failed to show the cohesiveness that it showed in its winning games. Fumbles and mechanical errors plagued the team throughout the game. Tennent stunned the confident Panthers by returning the opening kickoff for a touchdown; the rest of the game became an uphill contest. Highlights in the game for Cheltenham were Benny Dempsey's 35 yard scamper into the end zone climaxing a 65 yard drive in the second period, and Chris

Perry's 60 yard T.D. ramble for the Chelts' second score. Failure to convert P.A.T.'s cost the Panthers a tie.

Against Upper Dublin, the Chelts staved off a fourth quarter Cardinal rally to eke out a 12-7 decision on the losers' field. The heavily favored Panthers turned gamblers in this contest choosing not to punt the entire game. In all, they converted 10 fourth down punting situations into eight first downs. Their unconventional tactics nearly backfired on them as the Panthers failed to make the sticks in the closing minutes. However, a stingy defense preserved the Cheltenham victory.

The following week, the Panthers entertained unbeaten Upper Merion. In the battle of the league leaders Upper Merion emerged victorious by a 41-14 count.







In one of the most exciting games in years the Panthers dropped a 26-25 heartbreaker to Plymouth Whitemarsh. The spectacular offensive shown by both teams swung the lead back and forth. The Colonials drew first blood early in the first quarter but the Panthers fought gamely to earn a 12-7 lead at half time. The second half became an inferno of action as Cheltenham took a 25-19 lead with one minute remaining. The Colonials took the final kickoff and marched the length of the field, scoring with only three seconds left.

At Interboro the Panthers' dormant passing attack came to life as Cheltenham brought home a 20-0 non-league victory. The Chelts broke a sluggish first period stalemate when Tom Reifsnyder scored on a ten yard sprint out, giving Cheltenham a 6-0 half time lead. In the second half the Panthers became a different ball club, coupling tough defensive play with a balanced offensive attack. The Chelts tallied fourteen points in the last two periods, the final score coming on a beautiful 36 yard bomb from Tom Reifsnyder to Eric Matzkin.

On Saturday, November 18, the Panthers hosted Abington in the traditional match-up between the arch rivals. The Ghosts came into the contest with an impressive string of lop-sided league victories and were heavily favored to run the Panthers off the field. Rain, cold and strong winds hampered play throughout most of the first half. The game which nearly everyone thought would be a runaway, turned into a fierce defensive battle in which neither team could get its offense into gear. Abington knew it was in a ball game as the Ghosts took the field following a 0-0 half time score. The Suburban North champ finally managed to break the deadlock when they scored with 5:31 remaining, giving Abington a hard fought 6-0 triumph.





On January 2, the Panthers resumed league competition, entertaining Methacton in a home contest. The issue was never in doubt as the Chelts crushed the visiting Warriors 70-35. Three days later the hoopsters held off a rallying Upper Dublin squad in another home contest by a score of 85-75. Littlepage paced the Panther attack with 30 points and Sonny Gourley gave the Chelts additional rebounding strength in his initial starting assignment.


Bill Haff led all scorers with 24 points in the first meeting with arch-rival Abington as the Panthers staved off a tough Ghost aggregation by a 76-61 count. Following the Abington victory, the league-leading Chelts met Norristown on the Eagles' home floor. The game turned out to be the closest contest of the season with Rich Raden's four clutch free throws in the final 45 seconds providing a slim 61-58 Cheltenham margin.

The Norristown victory earned Cheltenham the Number 1 ranking in the Southeastern Pennsylvania Scholastic Basketball Ratings, a position they held for the remainder of the season. On January 16, the Chelts traveled to Chichester for a non-league tilt and brought home their 13th straight victory of the year, 74-60. A home-court squeaker over Upper Merion, 54-48, set the stage for a January 26 showdown with second-place Plymouth Whitemarsh. The visiting Colonials were completely outclassed by the Cheltenham machine, and fell before a capacity crowd of 2,000 cheering fans, 66-50. In their next two outings, the Panthers ran their unbeaten skein to seventeen with a 91-42 drubbing of Methacton and an 80-67 rout of the Cardinals from Upper Dublin.

With Littlepage and Haff tallying 21 points apiece, the Chelts clinched the league crown as they mowed over Abington in a home contest, 78-57. By winning the Suburban North title, the boys earned a spot in the PIAA Championship at the Palestra on February 22. The Panthers ran over their three remaining opponents: Norristown 68-55, Chichester, 83-45, and Upper Merion, 77-41, to post a regular season mark of 21 wins and no defeats.






Aquamen post 2-9 record; Kelley swims on to States










Weary John Hink receives congratulations from teammates after a grueling victory.

















Returning veterans bolster baseball pennant hopes




Add to their experience many talented sophomores, and the Panthers show the makings of an excellent squad. The team opens its season at home against Plymouth Whitemarsh on April 10.




Big John Adams prepares for mighty heave of shot put.


