The ceremony was a reunion of sorts for the many years of Glenside graduates, with bulletin boards of class pictures filling the school gymnasium.


Gwen Punchard, a graduate of the first class at Glenside, stood in front of her first-grade picture, naming each member of the class.

"We came here from the old school. It was like state of the art when we got here. We loved it. The kindergarten rooms had fireplaces. It's homey," Punchard said.

Alumni reflected on their memories of the school, while running into former classmates they hadn't seen in years. They gathered around the class pictures and took pictures of their own to remember the school. For those without cameras, prints of a pastel portrait done of the school by a local artist were for sale.

The 53-year-old building is not long for this world, as plans to tear it down and build a new school in its place are under way. According to Glenside teacher Cindy Goldberg, the new building should be open in about two years.

Reflecting on the change, Principal Bruce Williams said, "We're happy about the plans for the new building that will serve the community for many years to come. But it's certainly not easy to say goodbye to this building, built in 1956, and has been part of the community

A picture of the tree planting that took place on the school's first Arbor Day hung on a wall of the gymnasium. Leeds and her husband were part of that event.

"My husband Chuck is a horticulturist. He brought the trees to plant, these little trees. Now they're 50 feet tall," Leeds said.

Some who were not as far removed from Glenside still came to the event. Sean Sweeney, 26, still goes to the school to vote on Election Day. However, he came to the goodbye event to see former teachers and classmates.

"I loved it here. It's such a great community, with lots of great people. I have a lot of memories from this place," Sweeney said.

"It looks exactly the same as I remember it."


