EDITORIAL

Our modern society is oriented to values based on material possessions; and this, I believe, is a false and insecure base. Far too many of us are deeply entangled in the webs of social custom and social acceptance. The entire foundation of our lives is based on others and not on ourselves. What "they" think of what "their" reaction might be is considered the crucial matter. We tend to follow the masses, reaching for the concrete in life, never seeking the loftier. The certain basic possessions which are necessary for survival cannot be neglected, but the extent to which these fashion our lives is the crucial point. We need to live as individuals, for as we live we grow, and as we grow we should mature, and in the process become richer human beings.

Those persons who are truly rich are found in all walks of life, in all places of the world, and at all levels of maturity. The worker who walks briskly down the street whistling his favorite tune, the old man who owns the corner store and is the confidant of the young and the faithful friend of the old, the renowned author who possesses the rare gift of literary expression, the Peace Corps Volunteer in Viet Nam, the man next door may all be rich no matter what their social status. They grow daily through other people while learning to give of them-

selves. They make someone happy; they eagerly help at even the most menial of tasks; and they grow rich by living. The focal point of their work is the deed itself, not the recognition or acclaim which they might receive.

One must not be content to give only to others, for the self also needs to be cultivated. In the process of growth our most important step forward is that of learning the art of individual thought. It is necessary to develop analytical minds so that we may perceive the truth or the falsity of that which surrounds us. We should consider the opinions of others, but our personal views must not be left by the wayside. We must learn to question, and then accept or reject the doctrine on the basis of the opinions which we have formed. It is only after we have conquered the self that we may begin to understand the problems of others and the complexities of the world.

We have an obligation to the world. We must be the explorers of the unknown, the scientists, doctors, executives, laborers, and parents. As the architects of the future we may mold society into any form and we must not shirk from our responsibility. Is our future to be based on the false values of only the tangible; is this the only meaning of life for us?

This is the challenge that the future holds for us. Throughout the past year I have had the pleasure of serving as the editor of our school paper, and, with each task that I completed I grew a little more, and I began to know life and its richness. For this I thank you.

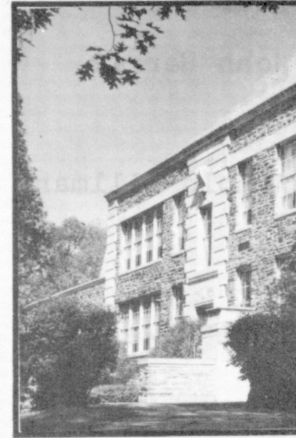
NINTH GRADE CLASS GIFT

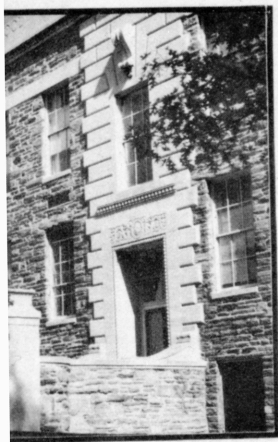
